# As of March 31, 2019 ...

- The Agency is the LARGEST Developmental Service (DS) Sector service provider in the West Region AND the LARGEST non-profit employer in Windsor - Essex County with over 516 part time and 208 full time employees. CUPE Local 3137 represents direct support employees and administration officers.
- High quality supports and services provided to over 700 children, youth and adults including community
  participation, accommodation supports, family supports, Select A Break respite options and employment supports.
  Continue, in collaboration with Regional Support Associates, to provide enhanced specialized services to people with
  extraordinary challenges.
- We own 52 properties, lease 6 and own 65 vehicles with 21 of those being wheelchair accessible vans.
- Our continued partnership with Ensemble (families) and New Day, Leaders of Today (advocates) ensures people receiving supports and families have a strong voice within the Agency.

# **Some Accomplishments**

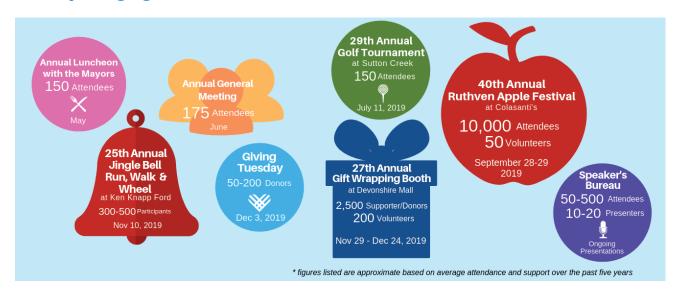
GRANT FUNDING was received for many projects allowing us to enhance supports, improve outcomes for people we serve and build community connections and collaborations. A few of note ....

- ▶ FIT TOGETHER: funded by Ontario Trillium Foundation. In partnership with the University of Windsor's Human Kinetics Department. Free exercise programs reached 78 participants, created online video exercise/gym etiquette manual, substantial data for future academic papers and saw student volunteers change career focus to DS Sector.
- **eVantage**: funded by MCCSS Employment & Modernization. Researching and piloting countless apps, increasing inclusive employment opportunities and leading a growing provincial consortium of employment service providers.
- As Safe As Possible (ASAP), "Say No to Exploitation & Human Trafficking": funded by MCSCS, Ontario's Safer & Vital Communities. Develop and launch online and in person curriculum to empower people with disabilities and build awareness with justice professionals.

Continue to provide strong leadership provincially. This includes attendance at conferences and forums presenting and showcasing the work of the agency over the past year. Presentations confirmed for eVantage at the Canadian Association for Supported Employment conference and both ASAP and Technology Enabled Supports at the Community Living Ontario conference. Presented at two MCCSS employee professional development events.

Career Compass, the agency's modernized employment service, connected to 127 people across the county at various stages of employment. 81 people were employed in their home communities. Last year Career Compass connected people to 55 new job opportunities. Youth In Action, the agency's summer work experience program, saw 17 youth employed last summer with another 30 youth registered for Summer 2019.
